There are different ways to describe "impressions" as one of the ways God speaks to us. It can be a sudden urge to do something, or perhaps a nudge, a prompting, or a sense that God is directing us in a specific way.

God addresses us in various ways: in dreams, visions and voices; through the Bible and extraordinary events; and so forth. ... Each way God communicates with us has its own special uses, but all the ways are not equally significant for our life with him. ... And from among the individual's experiences of hearing God, the "still, small voice" has a vastly greater role than anything else. ...

A major point of this book is that the still, small voice—or the interior or inner voice, as it is also called-is the preferred and most valuable form of individual communication for God's purposes. (Dallas Willard, Hearing God)
